FSA Delay and Difficulties by Atheena Kuriakose

At the end of the previous school year, all students in the third through eleventh grade, residing in the state of Florida, were required to take a new standardized test which was to take the place of the FCAT. This test is the Florida Standards Assessment, or FSA, designed to assess mastery of the new Florida Standards. While some are simply disappointed about the technical difficulties that occurred during testing sessions, others are downhearted about the delay of the scores, which are still not back to schools!

Once received, the test results will be used to calculate school grades, track student progress, and evaluate teachers. Some believe that the test was excessively troublesome. The amount of students affected by the technical difficulties encountered throughout the state was too strenuous to determine, but it was estimated that 1 to 5 percent of students had difficulties logging on, or staying logged on, to the test, which furthermore convinced many to deem the test invalid.

Even with the outcries, the test was still decided to be an accurate measurement of the standards.

The test was accompanied by many technical difficulties that postponed testing for many. Testing was suspended in many counties, such as Broward and Palm Beach. After a statewide glitch, the education commissioner proclaimed that the situation was "absolutely unacceptable."

Some problems that occurred were difficulties for administrators to start testing sessions, complication when it came to students signing in, the assessment allowing students to see questions a day before they should, and answers not being saved even after students repeatedly entered them. The technical difficulties produced by

the assessment not only extended the time expected for testing, taking away valuable learning time for the students, but also irritated students, parents, and administrators.

The scores were supposed to be sent to students over the summer break, but students are already several weeks into the new school year and the scores are yet to be sent. They are expected to be sent around November or December. The delay has frustrated many teachers and administrators, considering the results were supposed to help them see the capabilities of the students and help with placement in classes. Parents and students have also been affected as anxiety grows.

When districts receive test scores, parents will be some of the first to know, but, until then, schools continue to wait it out, wondering if the next testing season will bring similar problems.•

NOTIFICATION OF INSPECTION FOR ASBESTOS CONTAINING MATERIALS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has issued a final rule, 40 CFR Part 763, Asbestos Containing Material in schools, commonly referred to as AHERA. This rule requires all Local Education Agencies (LEAs) to identify asbestos containing materials (ACM) in their school buildings and to take appropriate actions to control the release of asbestos fibers.

All inspections for Pasco Middle School have been completed and a Management Plan describing the results of the inspection and the action plan to control any asbestos found during the inspection, where applicable, has been submitted to the governor for approval. A copy of this plan is located in the administrative office of this school and at the Pasco County Schools Maintenance & Facility Services Department and is available for review upon request.

OUT-OF-FIELD TEACHING ASSIGNMENTS

Individuals who are teaching out-of-field are certified in at least one area and are qualified to teach but are required to take additional course work or testing to add a coverage/endorsement to their certificate. The state also requires a teacher to take coursework/in-service towards an English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) endorsement, when the teacher is the primary language arts provider and/or reading teacher for an ESOL student.
